The Sports Arena

Sports, spectaculars, and show-exhibitions take on extra excitement and dimension when presented in a spacious setting. And they deliver full spectator enjoyment if, in addition, there's the Ice Capades. Or a full-size basketball court clear viewing of all the sights from a comfortable seat. Which is exactly what the Sports Arena provides.

For spectators, the Arena has 4,700 seats in permanent around-the-oval placement-every one a comfortable, clear-view delight. Crowd capacity can be increased, to fit the style and setting of any event, by adding temporary seating that brings the maximum attendance to 7,400 persons.

Space? On the big floor the Sports Arena offers 25,312 square feet of room without a single obstruction-ample for a three-ring

circus, a roaring rodeo, or the expansive displays of boat or home or other shows and exhibitions. For its varied uses,

the Arena floor can be flooded and frozenbecoming home ice for Saginaw's entry in the International Hockey League, or the setting for can be installed for school, college, or professional contests.

Whatever the occasion, the Sports Arena is designed to please those in the show as well as those watching.











"All the world's a stage," Shakespeare wrote ... and in the world of the performing arts, the stage can be all-important. Which should make the Music Hall-Theatre of the Saginaw Civic Center ... where the stage is 94 feet wide, 45 feet deep, and superbly equipped ... a welcome place for any performer or troupe to visit.

As for the audience, they find the Music Hall-Theatre designed for full spectator enjoyment of every presentation. Each seat . . . 1,245 on the main floor and 1,067 in the balconies . . . commands a full view of the stage. In addition, the aisles are wide, the auditorium is fully airconditioned, and the lobby areas are spacious.

Presentations in the Music Hall-Theatre will include major community assemblies as well as the full range of the performing arts. Among these are the music, dance, theatre, and lecture programs of the city's cultural groups . . . the

Saginaw Symphony Orchestra, the Community Concert Association, the Saginaw Town Hall, the First Nighter's series, and others. To these will be added the offerings of touring groups, including both national and Broadway stage companies, bringing plays and revues, recitals and concerts.

Technical features for staging programs are impressive. The stage, for example, has a loft capable of handling up to 50 "flying" elements such as curtains and backdrops. It is fronted by a full orchestra pit. Equipment for lighting effects and sound incorporates the latest advances. Backstage accommodations . . . offices, dressing rooms, rehearsal rooms, storage areas . . . are generous.

In short, the Music Hall-Theatre is a rare setting for the presentation . . . and enjoyment . . . of the performing arts.







About Civic Center operations

The Saginaw Civic Center was conceived, built, and is operated as a public facility. It is owned by the people of the City of Saginaw, through their municipal government. It is operated to advance the interests of the community and for the benefit of the people.

In this pattern, management of the Civic Center begins with the Mayor and the City Council. The Council's major actions for management are the laying down of broad guidelines for Civic Center operations, and the appointment of a Civic Center Board.

The work of the five members of the Civic Center Board is much like that of any board of directors or trustees. They have overall responsibility for Civic Center plans and operations and, within the guidelines set by the City Council, make the decisions on policy and rules for the Center. In addition, the Board selects and employs the Civic Center Manager.

All details of day-to-day operations are the Manager's responsibility. This involves:

- * Long-range planning—all arrangements involved in booking any of the Center's facilities for future use.
- * Current operations-the advance preparations, from ticket sales to equipment setup, for events coming tomorrow or this week.
- * Maintenance-cleanup, polishing and continuing repair and touch-up to keep the Civic Center in top shape.






Making a dream come true

Two shovelfuls of dirt, turned at 10:25 a.m. on August 6, 1969, marked the groundbreaking and start of construction for the Saginaw Civic Center. For some Saginawians that was the start of the dream.

But for others it was just one more step, a long-awaited step, in a dream that began years before. The dreamers were civic-minded individuals, proud of Saginaw and its spirit. Watching the city expand and advance in so many ways over the years, they saw a growing need for a modern and spacious showplace and focus for community-wide activities.

As the idea of a Civic Center grew, one man came to be identified informally as "Mr. Civic Center." He was Paul H. Wendler, early and constant advocate of the proposal, and a member of the Saginaw City Council since 1959. It is highly appropriate that, as Mayor Pro Tem, he shared in the groundbreaking and that, as Mayor of Saginaw, his is a key role in the formal dedication.

Transforming a broad vision into a precise reality is a process of patient, step-by-step perseverance. This began for the Saginaw Civic Center in the early 1960's with the proposal of urban renewal programs for some of Saginaw's downtown areas. New trends in locating commercial and industrial enterprises indicated the desirability of new uses for the land that would become available. The idea that the Civic Center be located here was promptly suggested and, after extensive consideration, was adopted.




Center was meant to be-is it possible to meas-


ure the soundness and wisdom of the dreamers.
















- A cluster of reinforcing steel for a main column in the stage area of the Music Hall-Theatre is set. June, 1970.



Finding your way around

The more you know about the Civic Center, the more rewarding your participation in any Civic Center event can be. A good way to begin is by studying the general floor plans, the "maps" of this community complex. These introduce you to the many comfort and convenience features available, and help you locate them quickly and easily.

Notice that, for a program utilizing all units of the Civic Center, it is possible to move freely between all sections of the complex. Or, if completely separate presentations are scheduled for one or all of the three main units, they can be closed off from one another. For this, each unit has its own general public and service entrances, its own storage areas, its own audience convenience features. All are indicated on the accompanying diagrams.

A few minutes of study, plus some casual exploration before a show or at intermission, can help you find just what you're looking for. Or ask the guides or ushers on duty. They'll be glad to help make your visit completely satisfying.


Sports Arena – Ice Show & Circus Seating Plan


Sports Arena – Ice Hockey Seating Plan

A most important feature of the Civic Center is the flexibility designed into the Sports Arena, the Assembly-Convention Hall, the Music Hall-Theatre. Each of these—by variations in arrangements of partitions, or seating, or special or temporary equipment—can accommodate programs of quite different scope and nature. For the Saginaw community, the result is a Civic Center that is the setting for a far greater range and richness of presentations than would otherwise be possible.

Many of the design factors for this flexibility appear in the general floor plans and diagrams here. The seating plans, in particular, can be most helpful to you in planning attendance at future events. The row and section designations shown are permanent, and can be used as references when ordering tickets. This has special application for events in the Sports Arena, which offers the greatest flexibility in seating arrangements for different occasions.

Reaching the Civic Center

Located in the heart of Saginaw's resurgent downtown, the Civic Center is easily accessible. For city residents, the network of main streets leading downtown also leads to the Civic Center site at Washington and Johnson Streets. Nearby conveniences for visitors begin with sheltered parking in a municipal ramp just across the street. And hotels, restaurants, and shopping facilities are all within easy distance.

Out of town visitors, arriving by air via United Airlines or North Central, are a scant 20 minuetes from the Civic Center. Motorists coming to Saginaw on Interstate 75, the region's main highway, will find the north-and-south loop of Interstate 675 the convenient route to the very doorstep of the Civic Center.
